Longtime fans of Revels productions know that there is a "library" of scripts that is shared by the nine regional organizations that run Revels shows. Our script is based on a tale of an old English hall, haunted by ghosts who appear each year on the solstice with merriment in mind. We re-imagined the story in the mountains of Colorado, where we could "mine" local history and mix our locally flavored stories and characters with signature Revels elements. We hope you are ready to sing (and dance!) along with the Ghosts of Hilbert's Hotel, as well as the family of "mortals" who must decide the great hall's fate. PROGRAM NOTES: THE GHOSTS OF HILBERT'S HOTEL

We are excited to bring you "The Ghosts of Hilbert's Hotel," a new Revels production that includes songs of different eras and stories about early Colorado, woven with the tale of a modern family facing a difficult decision.

The concept for our show began over the summer, when our story-writers met and put on their miner's hats, seeking the golden nuggets of this state's rich history. In 1859, the Colorado Gold Rush, later known as the Pike's Peak Gold Rush, drew an estimated 100,000 people to this area, many of them European Americans. Other precious metals were also discovered in the Rocky Mountains, railways were built, and small mining camps became bustling cities. Today, mining towns are still scattered throughout Colorado: Leadville, Georgetown, Cripple Creek, and Central City, among others. Some have turned to gambling to draw visitors.

We loved the idea of two brothers who had made their fortune mining in the Rocky Mountains and chose to build a grand family hall. Over the years the hall would have been passed down within the family, with each generation leaving its stamp on the building; it became Hilbert's Hotel, and once housed a casino. We decided to inhabit the Dairy Center's Gordon Gamm stage with a lively mix of reveling ghosts from four different eras: Pioneer, Victorian, 1940s, and 1970s. We compiled a list of songs to help us tell our story, some easily recognized while others you may be hearing for the first time. Costuming our actors was a blast!

While rooted in the past, our story takes place in the present. The descendants of the two brothers and current owners of the hotel have few ties to the area. They are visitors in the place their ancestors called



home, and they are keepers of traditions they no longer share. Estranged from the past, the living family struggles to make sense of the present, unsure of what the future will bring. It is up to the ghosts to remind them of what's important, so they can reach a decision satisfactory for all.
